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

Vision

Founded in 2009, Sisters of Nia, Inc. seeks to empower adolescent girls by providing cultural and educational programs designed to instill strong social skills, leadership development, and academic excellence in our young ladies. Our Vision is to inspire, encourage, and empower girls to reach their fullest potential and live their life with a purpose.

Our program spans three years and addresses various aspects of adolescent girls' lives, with a distinct focus each year from sixth through eighth grade. The program culminates in eighth grade with our Atlanta HBCU/Black History tour and a significant rites of passage ceremony. We stay closely connected with current participants and our alumnae, offering ongoing support by facilitating referrals for counseling, tutoring, and other essential community services.



Our Core Beliefs & Values

- We believe each girl has the potential to be successful.
- We believe each girl has the ability to change and to create change.
- We believe it is essential that each girl be taught to maintain a balance between personal and emotional health, personal growth, and self-care.
- We value each girl as a unique individual with unique gifts and talents.

- We value direct and honest communication between the leaders and the girls at an effort to maintain authenticity of the program.

Adolescent girls undergo a period of significant developmental changes that align with transitions from elementary to middle school and then from middle school to high school. These changes encompass physical growth and shifts in their lives, goals, behaviors, and personalities. Sisters of Nia aims to assist girls in thriving during these challenging phases by offering a curriculum grounded in Afrocentric principles, tailored to each grade level, and designed to provide support, nurturing, and empowerment.

Sisters of Nia welcomes girls from diverse ethnicities and Our extensive program backgrounds. data has demonstrated that engagement in our comprehensive three-year program results in notable improvements in ethnic pride, emotional maturity, self-esteem, decisionmaking abilities, academic performance, positive peer interactions, positive parental relationships, and life skills development. Our curriculum, activities, and events are thoughtfully designed, drawing upon well-researched theories to ensure optimal growth and success of our participants.


We grew from serving 17 zip codes in 2022 to 25 zip codes in 2023!


Sisters of Nia began in 2009 as an after-school program at Ps7 Middle School in the Oak Park neighborhood of Sacramento. Because we were schoolbased, we were only able to service girls who attended that school. After 7 years, we moved from the PS7 campus to the Sacramento Food Bank (still in the Oak Park neighborhood) so we could open the program to all girls in the Sacramento area. We stayed there for 2 years until we outgrew the space. We were fortunate to start meeting at Pacific Charter Institute; the space was free and our program could still be open to all girls in the community. We met there until Covid-19 hit, which caused us to move our meetings to Zoom for a year and a half. Fortunately, we were able to bring our in-person meetings back in October of 2021; we rented a space at St. Paul Missionary Baptist Church and stayed there for one year. September of 2022, we moved to Highlands Community Charter School; the space is free...such a blessing! We pride ourselves in being a diverse community; we currently service girls from 25 different zip codes. Check out a few stats from the most recent U.S. Census below:




THE NUMBERS... OUR FINANCES



WHAT DID WE ACCOMPLISH IN 2023? OUR YEAR IN REVIEW

2023 was another great year! We were able to reinstate several programs/activities AND expanded! Check out our year in review to learn a bit about all that we accomplished last year.

January

- Annual Mother/Daughter Spa Party; 1st one since 2019 due to Covid. Mothers & daughters spent time pampering each other with facials, hand scrubs, and foot massages.
- Our girls attended the show "Our Story" in preparation for Black History Month.




February

• Camp Nia Black History Month program: due to the demand for Camp Nia to continue, we kept the program going during the fall and winter. The Camp Nia girls came together with the Sisters of Nia girls to put on a Black History Month performance which was a blend of what they performed during summer and new performances they learned from the camp extension program. 21 girls returned from the Camp Nia summer program to participate in the Camp Nia extension program and over 150 people attended their Black History Month performance!



March

- Father/Daughter Bowling Competition: 1st one since 2019 due to Covid. It gets quite competitive and it's always a special treat to see all our Nia dads spending quality time with their daughters. The 1st place father/daughter team wins a trophy and bragging rights!
- Kings Game Tabling: Several fans stopped by our table to learn more about who we are and what we do and even added a personal affirmation to our "Wall of Affirmations."
- Hired Administrative Assistant: We welcomed Zara Carter-Alvarado to the Nia family; she has been instrumental in helping us behind the scenes.





April

- 1st Annual Donor Appreciation Mixer: Held at The Brickhouse, an art gallery in Oak Park, this was our THANK YOU to our donors who have supported us over the years. Several currently enrolled girls and Nia alumnae shared about their experiences in the program and how Nia continues to impact their lives today.
- Nia Swag Shop: We hosted a Pop Up at Underground Books in Oak Park; we sold hoodies, tumblers, and other swag. Nia alumni were there to share about the program and their experiences as a Nia girl.



May

- Big Day of Giving (BDOG): We hosted "A Taste of Nia" at TAP Wine Lounge in Del Paso Heights where some of our Nia girls shared about their experiences in the program. That day, many of YOU helped US raise over \$30,000!
- 8th Grade Highlights: Team building outing at Red Door and photo shoot before heading to Atlanta.
- Malcolm X Self Determination Award: Our Founder & Executive Director, Synthia Smith, received this award for exuding the principles and passion of a community builder and a way maker; awarded by The Voice of the Youth Founder, Berry Accius. This award is definitely very fitting for and greatly appreciated by Synthia.



June

- End of Program Year: 8th grade girls placed official Nia membership bracelets on wrists of 6th & 7th grade girls; all 6th & 7th grade girls received Adinkra awards.
- Scholarship Awards Reception: We awarded \$26,500 to 40 young women pursuing various levels of education above a high school diploma. Pleshette Robertson, founder and CEO of Sac Cultural Media Foundation, was our Emcee for the event; we had over 250 in attendance.
- 8th grade Atlanta HBCU/Black History Tour: Eight girls attended this life-changing trip. We visited Spelman College and Clark-Atlanta University; the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. King Center; the A.P.E.X. Museum; the National Center for Civil and Human Rights; and various other fun sites.



July

• 10th Annual Rites of Passage Celebration: We are excited to see what the future holds for our eight 2023 Nia alumnae!

• Camp Nia, our Summer Performing Arts Camp: 40 girls participated in the camp; we provided 11 full and 6 partial scholarships. Our theme, "Old Soul," was full of old-school themes, songs, and dances and featured Noa Sanaa, an up-and-coming author, poet, and activist. The show was amazing!



August

- Group Outing: Sacramento Music Circus to see the dressed rehearsal of "Ragtime." For many of our girls, this was their first experience seeing a professional musical production. (Not pictured)
- 13th Annual Retreat: Held at Quarry Park in Rocklin for our 7th and 8th grade girls with a focus on strengthening self-esteem, sisterhood, and problem-solving skills. Due to a sponsorship from the Women Lawyers of Sacramento, we were able to charter a bus so our whole group could ride to our retreat location together. Our girls participated in group challenge activities, challenge/ropes courses, zip lining, and pedal boating. Many of the girls overcame fears in order to participate in these activities and, in doing so, created a stronger sense of self-esteem as well as a stronger bond with their Nia sisters after accomplishing tasks together they never viewed as possible.



September

- New Nia Year Begins: 10 new 6th grade Nia girls began the Sacramento program. We also started a new cohort of 6th grade girls in Elk Grove at the Gil Albiani Community Center. This is amazing growth for our program... now we have two meeting locations! Our Elk Grove cohort meets on Monday evenings. We also hired four new facilitators to work with our two new cohorts of 6th grade girls. Three of our new facilitators are Nia alumni and the other is Camp Nia alumni...we are so honored and blessed to have each of them.
- Community Service: We partnered with the American River Parkway Foundation for the Great American River Clean-up Day. Service is an important part of our program; we want our girls to leave Sisters of Nia with the idea that "Service is the rent we pay for the privilege of living on this earth" (Shirley Chisolm).







October

- Our Promise (United Way) Kick Off @ State Capitol: We attend this annually at an effort to expose more people to Sisters of Nia (table pictured below to far left).
- Board Celebration: Our board attended a catered luncheon in celebration of all our accomplishments in the prior fiscal year (not pictured).




November

- Youth Leadership Conference: We hosted our annual Youth Leadership Conference in partnership with Cosumnes Community Services District and had 50 youth attend! We offered workshops in hands-only CPR, self-defense, and robotics; we also had two dynamic speakers (one poetess and a keynote), Zumba, and a dance performance. We had an overwhelmingly positive response from the youth who attended!


December

HOW IMPACTFUL ARE OUR PROGRAMS? CHECK OUT WHAT OUR GIRLS & PARENTS SAY!

Program evaluation serves as a cornerstone of our program's success and effectiveness. We prioritize the feedback loop by requesting participants to complete evaluations following each event they attend. Their insights and perspectives are not only welcomed but cherished, as they offer invaluable guidance for the ongoing growth and refinement of our program. By actively listening to and incorporating participant feedback, we can adapt, innovate, and ensure that our program continues to meet the evolving needs and expectations of our community. In essence, their contributions empower us to cultivate a more responsive, impactful, and meaningful program experience for all involved.



CAMP NIA PROGRAM STATS

After attending Camp Nia,

- 96% of our girls felt more confident about performing in front of other people.
- 100% of our girls felt more confident about being a Black girl.
- 92% of our girls felt safe to express themself during camp without being judged.
- 100% of our girls made new friends.
- 98% of our girls enjoyed the camp and hope to come back next summer.



ATLANTA HBCU/BLACK HISTORY TOUR HOW DID THIS EXPERIENCE IMPACT OUR GIRLS?

As a culminating rite of passage, the 8th grade Nia girls participate in a significant journey known as the Historical Black Colleges & Universities (HBCU)/Black History Tour. This excursion takes them to various HBCUs and sites of importance in African and African-American history. The aim is to complete their understanding of African history learned in monthly sessions and to deeply instill the Sisters of Nia principles. During the tour, the girls witness real-life connections to the lessons they've been taught. They experience firsthand the richness of African heritage and the resilience of the African-American community. These experiences reinforce their cultural identity and understanding.

HOW EFFECTIVE IS OUR MONTHLY PROGRAM?

END OF PROGRAM EVALUATIONS FROM OUR 2023 GRADUATES AND PARENTS...

Our 3-year program concludes with a rites of passage ceremony, signifying the girls' transition to higher levels of maturity, embodying purpose, confidence, and motivation as young women. To be considered Nia alumni, every girl is required to complete a sequence of eight tasks, symbolizing the Nia principles. These tasks encompass research, presentations, and interviews, facilitating the girls' exploration and connection with diverse African Americans in their families, communities, and career aspirations. As the program concludes, each girl emerges equipped with a toolkit, ensuring her readiness for the future ahead. Below is our 2023 alumni's feedback about their experience as a Nia girl.

Our Scholarship Program

Thanks to the generous donations of our supporters, we awarded 40 young women \$26,500 in scholarships in 2023! This was a tremendous success as this was the largest amount we have ever awarded without grant support. So, thank you to EVERYONE who donated to our 2023 scholarship fund. May of 2016 was our first year awarding scholarships; that was the first year we had alumnae girls graduating from high school. From 2016-2019, we awarded two scholarships per year...one was reserved for a Sisters of Nia alumnae and the other was open to any girl graduating high school in Sacramento County. Each scholarship award was \$500. In 2020, we awarded a total of five scholarships totaling \$5,000; one scholarship was reserved for a Sisters of Nia alumnae returning to college in the fall. In 2021, we awarded 24 scholarships totaling \$12,500. and in 2022, thanks to a grant we received from the California Commission on the Status of Women and Girls, we awarded \$50,000! 2022 was our largest year of scholarship awards in the history of the program.



"Sankofa" Award \$250 <u>Book</u> Scholarship

Sankofa is an African word from the Akan tribe in Ghana. The literal translation of the word and the symbol is "it is not taboo to fetch what is at risk of being left behind." The word is derived from the words:

- SAN (return)
- KO (go)
- FA (look, seek and take)

The Sankofa symbolizes the Akan people's quest for knowledge among the Akan with the implication that the quest is based on critical examination, and intelligent and patient investigation. The Sankofa symbol is based on a mythical bird with its feet firmly planted forward with its head turned backwards. The Akan believe the past serves as a guide for planning the future. To the Akan, it is this wisdom in learning from the past which ensures a strong future.

Sisters of Nia is excited to provide five \$250 book scholarships to our Sankofa awardees in support of their continued quest for knowledge and we hope they share their wisdom with those who come behind them.




WHAT'S NEXT?

Our 2023 Accomplishments:




Our 2024 Goals:

- Increase community partnerships.




